


Role



How you got here

I arrived here through my research, interviews, and findings. By speaking to people and gathering feedback, I noticed a difference in interviewing men and women. Men were more direct with their answers, while women tended to be a bit more reserved and took a moment to consider their responses. However, they opened up more when answering questions.



The very first interview was with Danielle Velez. She appeared quite nervous and shy, but she was very direct with her answers.

"No, I'm sorry, they don't. They make millions of dollars from the subway system. And what I'm sure they're doing is using most of that money for the higher-ups, who make terrible decisions. So the higher-ups in that agency are receiving a lot of money, and they're not making good decisions. I don't think it's fair that they make millions of dollars. Yes, people may skip paying the train fare, but mostly people do pay for it. It's not about the money. There's enough money; they're just not allocating it correctly."

We did uncover that there aren't many programs to assist graduate students.

Her idea worked best, and she had already implemented a similar program.

We Sprouted an opportunity statement on Alexa: "To help college students by providing a website to assist them with their financial needs and to support them in paying for grad school, while also connecting them with a coach or counselor to aid in the application process."

Interviews

Christopher Cubitt, a 38-year-old HR Rep from CUNY Baruch & NY Institute of Technology:



"Well, grad school for me was way easier than undergrad. It was like 100 times easier. It was a piece of cake compared to undergrad.

"So much easier to do grad school, but it's very valuable because you're really focused on one thing and you've learned that one thing.

"Hindsight's 2020. I think now that I'm 38 years old, it would have been good for me to take advantage of something like that. But I think a 20-year-old me or an 18-year-old me would have just said, 'I'm not doing it.' So, you know, I think it's a good resource to have, but I think there's gotta be a way to reach someone who might be 18."

Jessica Cerronie, 29-year-old Queens College student:


"It's super important, according to the new major laws that passed, to become a nutrition and dietitian as of 2024, if you don't have your master's.

Interview insights

Christopher Cubitt and Jessica Cerroni were at pretty opposite ends of the spectrum. Chris was more direct with his answers; once I hit the record button, he spoke more like an HR rep. Jessica was more shy about the whole thing; she looked around and thought about her answers. However, she did open up more as the conversation progressed.
